

## Reading Together - Setting the Scene

- Choose an appropriate time to read when both you, and your child, are relaxed.
- Choose a time that is free from distractions and interruptions.
- 3. Read for a short time only (10-15 minutes) unless your child is enjoying the story so much he/she doesn't want to stop.
- 4. Allow your child time to think before you offer help - sometimes they just need time to break down the word.
- 5. Make reading time fun. Give your child lots of praise.



## **How Can You Help?**

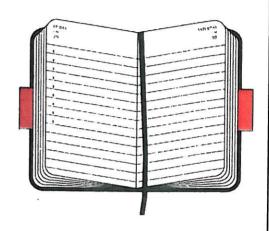
- Make sure you know the sounds that letters make (see the video on the website);
- Look at the sounds and syllables in words by breaking words up;
- Look at the pictures for clues to help;
- Read on and come back to a difficult word if your child gets stuck;
- Encourage your child to think about if what he has read makes sense:
- Ask your child to predict what he thinks might happen next;
- Discuss the plot and characters;
- Discuss how the story or events make you feel and why;
- Encourage your child to read with expression by modeling this;
  - Model how the punctuation makes reading more fluent;
  - Make comments in your child's reading log.

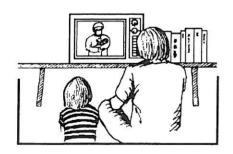
## What else can I do?
